

## 'Empire Day At Walton'

There was a large gathering of parents and friends in the School playing field on Tuesday morning, to meet Sir Godfrey Lagden, K.C.M.G., who gave the Empire Day address. — Amongst those present were Mr. R. Phillips, C.C., the Rev. C. E. C. Lefroy, Miss Atkinson and Mr. C. R. Mansell (Headmaster).

Sir Godfrey Lagden was introduced by the Headmaster, and in the course of an interesting address he dwelt upon the extent of resources of the Empire, which, he said, had been built up, not by the sword, but by the courage and loyalty of those who came before us. If our splendid ancestors had not carried out their work we should indeed be "Little England" — simply a little island called England in the North Sea.

The Flag of Britain, he said, is respected all over the world, and English currency is accepted everywhere. No other nation can claim this. Our duty is to try to prosper the Empire, and to better the conditions of all who live in it. Liberty and Justice alone will enable us to maintain it. It is for us to guard the great heritage, to remember our duty to God and our neighbour and to be faithful to our King and Country.

There was some excellent dancing by the boys and girls, including the Flamborough Sword Dance, performed by eight little girls in Scottish national costume (one of the most pleasing items), and the Irish jig, also given by girls in national dress. The united singing of "The Recessional" and of "Jerusalem" followed.

The Vicar of Hershams also briefly addressed the gathering and expressed thanks to Sir Godfrey Lagden for his admirable discourse. — In reply, Sir Godfrey commented in appreciative terms on all he had seen, and congratulated the staff upon the excellent arrangement of the proceedings.

Three rousing cheers were given for the King, and the National Anthem was sung, the function terminating with the children marching away, saluting as they passed the Union Jack.
